Project Objective:

Provide funding to the Illinois' Raptor Center in order for them to present the "Owls of Illinois" program to the Albion Grade School and Edwards County High School students. Purchase additional supplies for classroom presentations including owl pellets, forceps, food chain activity kits, a Great Horned owl skull, plus an owl pellet and common prey display.

Project Description:

The "Owls of Illinois" program was presented to Albion Grade School and Edwards County High School students on April 17th, 2014. A Great Horned, Barred, Barn, Short-eared, and two Eastern Screech owls accompanied Jack Nuzzo and Jane Seitz of the Illinois Raptor Center to the high school gymnasium. One-hour assemblies were scheduled for the K through 4th grades, 5th through 8th grades, and high school students. Students became aware of the different species of owls living in or migrating through Illinois and the role that owls have in the ecosystem. Nuzzo discussed identification by sight and sound, preferred habitat, choice of prey, and the population status of each owl species. He also pointed out the physical characteristics that categorize owls as birds of prey.

Further investigation of owls and their diet continued in the classrooms. I scheduled individual "Hungry Hoot" programs with teachers from 1st through 7th grades. "Hungry Hoot" programs included a powerpoint presentation and a hands-on activity. Students learned about an owl's feathers (silent flight), excellent hearing (location of ears), talons, eyes, head rotation, choice of prey, regurgitation of pellets, and strategies used while searching for prey. First and second grade students created owl paper bag puppets. Third and fourth graders constructed a food chain model to illustrate how each link is consumed by another organism until reaching the top member "the owl". Students in the fifth through seventh grades dissected regurgitated owl pellets and identified the skeletal remains of the owl's prey.

During the classroom presentations, emphasis was placed on the Barn Owl's population status and the conservation efforts that are currently taking place in Illinois. Third grade students created posters in order to educate the public about Barn Owls. Each poster included a fact about Barn Owls and a drawing depicting the information. Posters have been on display at the Citizens National Bank in Albion and in the Visitor Center at Beall Woods SP.

Program participants will be less likely to pollute or destroy an owl's habitat / nesting site and more likely to install nest boxes.

Outcomes Achieved:

Participants acquired a greater respect and appreciation for wildlife and the environment. This awareness can now be shared with future generations. Posters created by students will be viewed by hundreds of visitors at Beall Woods State Park and will hopefully increase visitor's knowledge about Barn Owls and their needs for survival.
