Dear Mr. Bentson:

This letter concerns the Endangered Species Consultation for the project noted above, located in Grundy County, Township 33 & 34 North, Range 8 East, Sections 1, 2, 11-14, 35, 36. This project was submitted for consultation in accordance with the Illinois Endangered Species Protection Act [520 ILCS 10/11], the Illinois Natural Areas Preservation Act [525 ILCS 30/17], and Title 17 Illinois Administrative Code Part 1075.

The project involves spraying of guardrails in Gooselake Township.

The Department has completed its review of the project and determined that, with the exceptions below, the resources identified by EcoCAT in the vicinity are unlikely to be affected.

The state threatened and endangered **Blacknose Shiner** (*Notropis heterolepis*), **American Bittern** (*Botaurus lentiginosus*), **King Rail** (*Rallus elegans*), **Northern Harrier** (*Circus cyaneus*), **Common Gallinule** (*Gallinula galeata*), and **Redveined Prairie Leafhopper** (*Aflexia rubranura*) are in the vicinity of the project area and likely to be affected by the project activities. To avoid any impact to these species the Department recommends:

- Provide a 100 feet buffer zone for the river and any stream (mechanical treatment)
- Consider spot spraying within a 100 feet buffer zone
- Strict adherence to label instructions is highly recommended
- Refrain from spraying in winds in excess of 10 mph to prevent off-target drift

Consultation under 17 Ill. Adm. Code Part 1075 is completed. In accordance with 17 Ill. Adm. Code 1075.40(h), please notify the Department of your decision regarding these recommendations. This consultation is valid for two years unless new information becomes available that was not previously considered; the proposed action is modified; or additional

species, essential habitat, or Natural Areas are identified in the vicinity. If the project has not been implemented within two years of the date of this letter, or any of the above listed conditions develop, a new consultation is necessary.

The natural resource review reflects the information existing in the Illinois Natural Heritage Database at the time of the project submittal, and should not be regarded as a final statement on the site being considered, nor should it be a substitute for detailed site surveys or field surveys required for environmental assessments. If additional protected resources are encountered during the project's implementation, you must comply with the applicable statutes and regulations. Also, note that termination does not imply IDNR's authorization or endorsement of the proposed action.
